A Home for Monarchs

- ① Good morning, neighbors. Our empty corner lot could become a monarch butterfly garden. Monarchs need milkweed because their caterpillars eat only milkweed leaves. Adult butterflies also drink nectar from flowers. By planting both kinds of plants, we can give monarchs food during more than one part of their lives. This small change can make a useful stop for traveling butterflies.
- ② First, our class can choose a sunny space and draw a simple garden plan. Next, volunteers can remove weeds and add compost to the soil. Then we can plant milkweed and nectar flowers, such as coneflowers or zinnias. Clear steps help everyone know what to do. They also show that the project can begin with tools and time we already have.
- ③ A butterfly garden will not solve every problem monarchs face, but it is a helpful local action. It can make our school grounds brighter while giving insects a needed resource. I hope the neighborhood association will approve the garden plan this spring. With a clear plan and shared work, this corner can become a place where monarchs can find food.
