Welcome to Our Garden

- ① Good morning, visitors! [Smile and wave.] Our school garden began as four small wooden beds near the playground. Today, students grow beans, lettuce, and bright marigolds there. [Speak at a cheerful, medium pace.] I will show you how a tiny seed can become food or a flower. First, let us look closely at the soil.
- ② Now I need everyone to listen carefully. [Lower your voice and slow down.] Seeds need water, air, and warmth before they can sprout. If the soil is too dry, the seed may stay asleep. [Point to the watering can.] We check the garden each morning, then give plants only the water they need. Careful watering helps roots grow strong.
- ③ At harvest time, the garden gives us a reason to celebrate. [Raise your hands and speak with excitement.] Last spring, our class picked enough lettuce for a tasting table at family night. We also saved marigold seeds for next year. [Pause after this sentence, then look around the room.] Gardens teach us patience, teamwork, and care. Who would like to help plant the next seeds?
