A Speech to Remember

- ① Speeches and poems can carry history in a small number of carefully chosen words. When people recite them, they share ideas that mattered at an important time. The Gettysburg Address was spoken by President Abraham Lincoln on November 19, 1863, during the Civil War. It honored soldiers who died at the Battle of Gettysburg and reminded the nation of its founding ideas.
- ② At Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, in 1863, President Abraham Lincoln gave a short speech during the Civil War. These five lines come from the beginning of the Gettysburg Address. Read them as an excerpt, not as separate ideas: “Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war,”
- ③ To prepare to recite an excerpt, first learn what the words mean and where one thought ends. Notice repeated words, important ideas, and punctuation. Plan your pace so listeners can follow the meaning. Practice a few lines at a time, using a steady, clear voice. Then connect the lines so the excerpt sounds like one complete message.
