City Trees at Work

- ① On a hot day, a row of trees can make a sidewalk feel cooler. Leaves block some sunlight before it reaches pavement and buildings. Trees also release water vapor from their leaves, which can cool the air nearby. Because of these jobs, city trees do more than make streets look green. They help create cooler places for people to walk, play, and wait for buses.
- ② Tree roots help during rainstorms, too. Soil around roots can soak up water, so less rain may rush across hard streets at once. This can lower the chance of some flooding. Roots also hold soil in place, helping prevent it from washing away. When planners choose places for trees, they can use these benefits to design neighborhoods that handle rain better.
- ③ City trees need care to keep doing this work. Young trees need water while their roots grow, and all trees need enough space for roots and branches. People can protect trees by keeping trash and harmful liquids out of the soil. A tree may seem still, but it is part of a busy system that cools air, manages water, and supports life in a city.
