Planning a Bike Safety Flyer

- ① Before I write a bike safety flyer, I make a plan. My purpose is to help new riders protect their heads and follow street rules. I will give the flyer to fourth-grade students who ride bikes to school or in their neighborhoods. They need clear facts, not long speeches, because they may read the flyer quickly before going outside.
- ② First, I set two goals for the flyer. I want readers to wear a helmet that fits, and I want them to stop, look left-right-left, and listen before crossing a driveway. A bold heading, short numbered steps, and a picture of a properly fitted helmet will help my audience find the important ideas. I will not add hard words that could confuse young riders.
- ③ Next, I check whether every part matches my plan. Instead of writing, "Helmets are useful," I will write, "Wear a helmet every time you ride." This direct sentence tells my audience exactly what to do. At the bottom, I will add, "Ask an adult to check your helmet straps." That final step supports my goal of helping riders use helmets safely.
