A Garden Plan

- ① Our school plans to turn a sunny strip of lawn into a pollinator garden. First, the garden can give bees and butterflies food from spring through fall. Pollinators help many plants make seeds and fruit. Because the space is near the fourth-grade windows, students can also observe insects without leaving the building. These reasons explain why the project matters.
- ② Next, the garden plan focuses on what will be planted. Students will choose native flowers, such as purple coneflowers and black-eyed Susans, because these plants grow naturally in the area. The class will place flowers in groups so pollinators can find them easily. A small water dish with stones will give insects a safe place to drink. Bright painted signs are not part of the plan because they do not help pollinators.
- ③ Finally, the group will measure whether the garden is helping. Once a week, students will count the kinds of pollinators they see during ten minutes. They will record the weather, since rain or wind can change insect activity. The class will compare counts from different months and share the results in a short report. Details about the color of students' backpacks would not belong in that report because they do not explain the garden's impact.
