Waste-Free Lunch Day

- ① Hello Riverbend students, our school will hold a Waste-Free Lunch Day next Friday. The Green Team, a group of fourth- and fifth-grade volunteers, is sharing this message so everyone can prepare. Bring lunch in reusable containers if you can. Choosing a refillable water bottle instead of a throwaway bottle also cuts cafeteria trash during lunch.
- ② On Waste-Free Lunch Day, students will eat in the cafeteria as usual. After lunch, Green Team members will weigh the bags of trash from each grade. We will post the results near the library. Our goal is not to make perfect lunches. We want to show how small choices can reduce the amount of waste our school sends away.
- ③ To help you take part, the Green Team will place a reminder sign by the school entrance on Thursday. The sign will list examples, such as a cloth napkin, a lunch box, and a reusable spoon. If you forget these items, you may still eat lunch. You can help by sorting your trash carefully and telling a friend about the event.

1	Who is the author of this message?	The Green Team, a group of fourth- and fifth-grade volunteers, wrote the message.
2	Who is the main audience for this message? Use one detail from the passage to support your answer.	The audience is Riverbend students. The message begins, "Hello Riverbend students," and tells students what to bring for lunch.
3	What is the main purpose of the message?	Its purpose is to help students prepare for Waste-Free Lunch Day and encourage choices that reduce cafeteria trash.
4	How do the reminder sign and the examples of reusable items help the message achieve its purpose?	They remind students about the event and show them specific items they can use, making it easier to take part.
