Beaver Watch at Pine Creek

- ① Have you seen a tree stump shaped like a pencil? A beaver may have chewed it. Beavers use strong front teeth to cut wood. They build lodges, which are homes made from sticks and mud. At Pine Creek Park, you might spot tooth marks near the water. Look carefully, but stay on the path with an adult.
- ② Beavers do more than build homes. Their dams slow moving water, which can create ponds. Ponds can give frogs, fish, and ducks places to live. A dam can also change where water flows, so it is important not to pull apart sticks or toss rocks into one. Quiet visitors have a better chance of seeing wildlife.
- ③ If you find fresh chips of wood, tell a park guide or another adult. Then watch from far away. Beavers are wild animals, and they need space to feed, swim, and care for their young. Take a photo only if you can do so without leaving the path. Your careful choices help Pine Creek stay a safe home for animals.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Who is this guide written for? Give two clues from the text.	It is written for young visitors to Pine Creek Park, likely visiting with adults. Clues include "you might spot," "stay on the path with an adult," and the direction to tell a park guide.
2	What are the guide's two main purposes?	To teach visitors facts about beavers and to tell them how to watch beavers without disturbing them or their habitat.
3	What technique does the writer use in the first paragraph to help young visitors picture signs of a beaver? Explain how it helps.	The writer asks a question and compares a chewed stump to a pencil. This gives visitors a familiar picture of what beaver tooth marks may look like.
4	Why does the writer explain what dams do before telling readers not to pull apart sticks or toss rocks into a dam?	The explanation shows that dams create habitat and change water flow. It gives readers a reason to leave dams alone.
