A Garden Letter

- ① June 18, 1944. Dear Cousin Elena, our town asked families to grow vegetables in small gardens this summer. Mother and I planted beans beside the back fence. The grocery store has fewer canned foods because many supplies are being sent to soldiers. I saved seeds from last year's squash so we can plant more next week.
- ② Yesterday, a neighbor showed us how to use kitchen scraps in a compost pile. We need every bit of food we can raise, so no one wastes peelings or wilted leaves. My brother Tom wants to join the army when he is older. For now, he carries water to the garden before school and checks for hungry bugs.
- ③ At school, our teacher says the garden is one way children can help during the war. I miss you, Elena, and I hope your family is safe in New Mexico. When you visit after the harvest, I will make soup with our beans and squash. Please write back and tell me whether you have a garden, too.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What time period was this letter written in? Give two clues from the letter.	It was written in 1944 during World War II. Clues include the date, supplies being sent to soldiers, and the teacher mentioning the war.
2	What do you learn about the individual who wrote the letter? Give two details.	The writer is a school-aged child who is Elena's cousin and Tom's sibling. The writer helps grow a garden.
3	What situation is the writer's family facing? Explain why they are growing vegetables and saving scraps.	The family has less food available at the grocery store because supplies are going to soldiers. They grow food and use scraps so they do not waste anything.
4	Who is the letter written to, and why did the writer send it?	It is written to Cousin Elena. The writer shares news about the garden, checks on Elena's family, and asks whether Elena has a garden.
