### Rainy Garden Plans

- ① On Monday morning, rain soaked Lincoln Elementary’s garden beds. Ms. Ortiz, the science teacher, wrote a message in the school newsletter. She explained that the garden would close for two days because the wet soil could be damaged. Writing for families who needed clear plans, she used a calm, practical voice. She also asked adults to send rain boots on Thursday, when students could check the beds.
- ② That afternoon, Jayden Lee recorded a short video for the student news channel. He said he felt disappointed because his class had planned to measure bean plants that day. Still, Jayden told students not to enter the garden. As a fourth grader speaking to classmates, he used friendly words and suggested drawing the plants from the classroom window instead.
- ③ Two days later, Mr. Chen, a nearby gardener, posted a letter on the community website. He praised the closing because walking on muddy beds presses soil tightly around plant roots. Unlike Jayden, he was not worried about missing one lesson. As an experienced gardener writing after the rain, Mr. Chen focused on protecting the plants and offered to help students loosen the soil when it dried.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

Gardener message: Neighbors, please stay on the path while the beds finish drying. I will show volunteers how to gently loosen the soil around the roots.
