Jordan Researches City Gardens

- ① Jordan chooses city gardens as a research topic after seeing tomatoes grow beside an apartment building. Jordan first asks, “Do city gardens help people?” This question could be answered with yes or no, and it does not name which people or kinds of help. Jordan looks at photos of gardens, notices neighbors working together, and decides to ask questions that invite fuller answers.
- ② Jordan writes, “How do city gardens change the food choices of families who use them?” The question names food choices and families, so a researcher can seek interviews, menus, and garden records. Jordan also asks, “What makes some neighborhood gardens last for many years?” This question reaches beyond plants. It could lead to research about water, land rules, money, and community teamwork.
- ③ As Jordan learns more, Jordan keeps a list of new ideas. A report about a garden’s rain barrel leads to a question about saving water. A map showing gardens in different neighborhoods leads to a question about fair access to fresh food. Jordan understands that strong research questions can grow from details and connect one topic to related ideas.
