A Sign for the Garden

- ① Jayden's class wanted to make a sign about pollinators in the community garden. Their question was, "How do bees help plants make fruits and seeds?" Jayden found a library book called *Busy Bees* by Dr. Elena Ruiz, an entomologist. The book explained that bees move pollen from one flower to another. It listed a publication date of 2022 and included a page of sources.
- ② Next, Jayden opened a webpage from the City Parks Department. The page described the garden's bee-friendly flowers and reported that volunteers planted 18 new flower beds in spring 2025. Near the top, it said, "Updated March 2026." Because the city department runs the garden and the page had a recent update date, Jayden decided it was useful evidence for a sign about that garden.
- ③ Jayden used the book for a general bee fact and the city page for a local fact. Jayden wrote, "Bees carry pollen between flowers, and volunteers added 18 flower beds in 2025," in their own words. The sign named both sources. Jayden did not use a colorful blog post called "Bee Facts!" because it had no writer's name, date, or links to sources.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

My question: What do monarch butterflies need? Print source: Monarchs and Milkweed by Anurag A. Agrawal. It is credible because Agrawal is a Cornell University ecology professor, and it is relevant because it explains monarchs and milkweed. In my own words, monarch caterpillars eat milkweed leaves. Digital source: the National Park Service's monarch butterfly webpage. It is credible because the National Park Service is a government agency that provides wildlife information, and it is relevant because it explains monarch habitats. In my own words, adult monarchs drink nectar from flowers.

Accept source judgments that use passage evidence, such as author expertise, source links, a responsible organization, and a clear update date. For Part 3, accept different topics and sources if the student names one print and one digital source, gives sensible credibility and relevance reasons, and paraphrases rather than copies facts.
