The Garden Pipe

Near the gate, she found Mr. Lee staring at a broken water pipe. “The seedlings need a drink,” he said. Maya set down her toolbox and looked at the puddle spreading by his boots.
- ② First, Maya tightened the loose metal ring with a wrench. Water sprayed across her sleeves, but the pipe still dripped. Mr. Lee shook his head. Maya noticed a rubber washer lying beside the tool shed. “This small circle may be the missing piece,” she said. She slid it inside the pipe, then turned the handle. The dripping stopped.
- ③ Just then, sunlight broke through the clouds. A thin stream ran from the pipe into the garden bed, and the drooping bean plants lifted their leaves. Mr. Lee smiled. “You watched carefully instead of giving up,” he said. Maya wiped mud from her hands and grinned. As she packed her toolbox, she decided to learn how to fix more things around the garden.

1	How do the details about rain, dark soil, and a puddle help you picture the setting?	They show that the community garden is wet after rain, which makes the broken water pipe an important problem.
2	What does Mr. Lee's statement, "The seedlings need a drink," reveal about him?	It shows that he is concerned about the young plants getting water.
3	How does the word "but" in the second paragraph help move the plot forward?	It shows that Maya's first repair does not work, so she must look for another solution.
4	How do the details about the bean plants and Maya's final decision show the resolution?	The plants receive water after the pipe is fixed, and Maya decides to learn to fix more things.
