Coral Reef Sources

- ① Text 1, from a park ranger's guide: Coral reefs are rocky-looking structures built by tiny animals called coral polyps. Polyps live in clear, warm, shallow ocean water. Reefs give fish, crabs, and sea turtles places to hide, find food, and raise young. Water that becomes much too warm can damage the polyps and the reef.
- ② Text 2, from a marine scientist's report: Reef-building corals need a partnership with tiny algae that live inside them. The algae use sunlight to make food, and the corals share that food. When water stays too warm, corals may lose their algae and turn pale. This event, called bleaching, can leave corals weak or dead.
- ③ Text 3, from an aquarium volunteer's article: People can help reefs even when they live far from the ocean. Using less electricity can reduce greenhouse gas emissions, which contribute to warming. Visitors near reefs should not touch coral. Touching can break coral or rub off its protective mucus, which helps protect it from germs and disease.

1	What important point is supported by both Text 1 and Text 2? Give the point and one detail from each text.	Too-warm water harms corals. Text 1 says it can damage polyps and reefs, and Text 2 says corals can lose algae, bleach, and become weak or die.
2	What key detail does only Text 2 add to the shared topic of coral health?	Text 2 explains that corals partner with algae, which use sunlight to make food that corals share.
3	How does Text 3 add to the information about warming in Text 1 and Text 2?	Text 3 gives people an action to help, using less electricity to reduce greenhouse gas emissions that contribute to warming.
4	A student wants evidence that reefs are homes for other animals. Which text should the student use, and what key detail supports it?	Text 1. It says reefs give fish, crabs, and sea turtles places to hide, find food, and raise young.
