Beavers at Work

- ① Beavers are often called nature's engineers because they change the places where they live. Using their strong teeth, they cut branches and carry mud, stones, and sticks to a stream. Their goal is to build a dam, a wall that slows moving water. Behind the dam, a pond forms. The pond gives beavers a safer place to build their homes, called lodges.
- ② When a dam blocks part of a stream, water spreads across nearby land. This change can create a wetland, an area of shallow water and water-loving plants. Frogs may lay eggs there, and ducks may find food among the plants. The dam also holds water during dry times. As a result, some animals have water to use even when the stream would otherwise become smaller.
- ③ Beaver dams do not help every part of a stream in the same way. Water above a dam becomes slower and deeper, while water below it may become lower for a time. People sometimes remove dams when roads or farms might flood. Still, scientists study beaver ponds because these ponds can provide homes for many kinds of plants and animals. This comparison shows that one dam can have both benefits and challenges.
