A Better Recess Refill

- ① Our school should add a water bottle filling station near the gym. Right now, students often wait in line at one fountain after recess. A filling station would let students refill bottles quickly and return to class ready to learn. This change would help many students every day, not just one team or class at a time.
- ② First, the station could cut down on waste. In 2018, the Environmental Protection Agency reported that the United States generated more than 14 million tons of plastic containers and packaging as waste. When students refill sturdy bottles, fewer single-use bottles may end up in trash cans. Second, drinking water after exercise helps students replace fluid lost through sweat. Placing the station by the gym makes this healthy choice easy at the moment students need it.
- ③ Some people may worry that a new station costs money. However, the school could ask the parent group or local businesses to help pay for it. A station near the gym would save time, support healthy habits, and reduce plastic waste. For these reasons, the principal should include a filling station in the next school improvement plan for students.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should add a covered bike rack near the front entrance. First, a roof would keep bikes dry during rain. After rain, bikes left outside have wet seats and handlebars. Some people may worry about the cost, but the school could ask a local hardware store to donate materials. A covered rack would also encourage more students to ride bikes instead of coming by car.
