A Garden for Our School

- ① Our school should turn the empty strip beside the playground into a native plant garden. Native plants are kinds that grow naturally in our area. Their flowers can give bees and butterflies nectar, a sweet liquid they drink. A bright garden would also make the walk to recess feel more welcoming than a patch of bare dirt. This small change could help living things and students every day.
- ② Some people may worry that a garden would cost too much. Yet families could donate seeds, and students could start many plants in reused containers. The garden would not need fancy statues or a huge fence. By choosing local plants, the school could save water because these plants are suited to the rainfall here. A simple garden can be useful without being expensive.
- ③ Picture a butterfly resting on purple flowers while students sketch it in science notebooks. That image helps us see what the garden could offer. The garden could become an outdoor place for observing insects, measuring plant growth, and reading quietly. School leaders should approve a garden plan this spring. Let us use one unused space to create a helpful, beautiful habitat.
