Poems Take Shape

- ① Poets choose patterns to help readers hear and picture ideas. Free verse has no required rhyme or line length. Its line breaks can slow a reader down or spotlight an important word. In "River at Dusk," the poet uses short lines: "Water slips / between black stones / quietly." The last word stands alone, so the quiet feeling lingers.
- ② Rhymed verse repeats end sounds in a planned pattern. In "Kite Flight," the first and second lines end with sky and fly. The third and fourth lines end with string and sing. This AABB pattern gives the poem a smooth, songlike sound. The poet also uses four lines of similar length, making the kite's steady climb feel orderly and calm.
- ③ A haiku is often three lines with a 5-7-5 syllable pattern. It usually captures one brief moment, often from nature. "A blue jay calls out" has five syllables. A limerick has five lines, a strong beat, and an AABBA rhyme pattern. Its first, second, and fifth lines are usually longer. These playful design choices can make a funny story bounce along.

1	What does free verse not require, and how can its line breaks help readers?	Free verse does not require rhyme or a set line length. Its line breaks can slow readers down or spotlight an important word.
2	Which end words rhyme in "Kite Flight," and what rhyme pattern do they make?	Sky rhymes with fly, and string rhymes with sing. They make an AABB pattern.
3	How is the design of a haiku different from the design of a limerick?	A haiku has three lines and often follows a 5-7-5 syllable pattern. A limerick has five lines, a strong beat, and an AABBA rhyme pattern.
4	How do the similar line lengths in "Kite Flight" support the poem's idea?	They make the kite's steady climb feel orderly and calm.
