A Falcon's Dive

- ① High above a rocky coast, a peregrine falcon watches the water below. Its sharp eyes can spot a small bird from far away. When the falcon begins a hunt, it does not flap wildly. Instead, it folds its wings and drops through the air. This controlled dive is called a stoop. The bird steers with tiny movements.
- ② During a stoop, the falcon may reach more than 200 miles per hour. Air rushes past its body, yet the bird keeps its head steady. Special baffles, or small structures, inside its nostrils help manage the air. Without them, fast-moving air could make breathing difficult. The falcon's narrow wings also help it control its path.
- ③ A stoop is useful when a falcon chases another bird in open space. However, speed alone does not guarantee a meal. The falcon must choose the right moment to dive and turn quickly if its prey changes direction. After a successful hunt, it may carry its food to a perch or a nest. There, it can eat safely.
