Beavers Build Habitats

- ① At the edge of a wetland, a beaver begins a busy night. The animal gathers branches, mud, and stones to repair its dam, a wall built across moving water. The dam slows the stream and creates a pond. Near the pond, the beaver's lodge serves as a home and a safe place to rest. Its underwater entrance helps protect the beaver from many predators.
- ② Beavers change more than one animal's home. As water spreads behind a dam, the area may become a larger wetland. This habitat can support frogs, fish, insects, and water birds. Scientists collect evidence, such as water-depth measurements and animal observations, to study these changes. Their data can show whether the pond is helping different species find food, shelter, and places to raise young.
- ③ People sometimes use the general word animals when they describe a wetland. A scientist may choose a more precise word, such as amphibians, mammals, or birds. Each word gives clearer information. For example, calling a frog an amphibian tells readers about its group. Precise vocabulary helps a field report explain what happened at a study site without making readers guess.
