- ③ At the far end of the garden, Maya followed a narrow path between rows of lettuce. The path opened into a wide space beside the compost bin. She carried a light bucket at first, but it grew heavy after she filled it with water. Before leaving, Maya thought the garden needed care now and would reward her later.
