The Box Beneath the Vines

- ① At the edge of the community garden, Lena found a wooden box tucked beneath bean vines. A silver latch held it shut, and rain tapped the lid like tiny fingers. Lena had come to pick tomatoes for her grandmother, but the box made her pause. Who had hidden it there, and why? She glanced toward the garden gate, where the other volunteers were leaving.
- ② Lena reached for the latch, then pulled her hand back. Her grandmother always said, "Ask before you open what is not yours." The words rose in Lena's mind as clearly as the smell of wet soil. Still, the box seemed to whisper, Open me. Lena imagined maps, seeds, or a note from someone who needed help. She decided to carry it to the garden office instead.
- ③ In the office, Mr. Ortiz smiled when he saw the box. "That is our seed library," he said. Inside were labeled packets and a notebook. Gardeners borrowed seeds, planted them, and later returned new seeds from their harvests. Lena laughed softly. The mystery had not held a treasure map, yet it held something better: a plan for sharing. She wrote her name in the notebook and chose three sunflower seeds.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What comparison does the author use to describe the rain on the box? How does this comparison affect the mood of the opening?	The rain "tapped the lid like tiny fingers." This makes the box seem alive or mysterious.
2	Why does the author include Lena's question, "Who had hidden it there, and why?"	The question shows Lena's uncertainty and introduces the mystery of the box.
3	How do Lena's grandmother's words affect Lena's decision about the box?	The words remind Lena not to open something that is not hers, so she takes the box to the garden office.
4	Why does the author contrast a "treasure map" with "a plan for sharing" near the end?	The contrast shows that Lena's expectations change and that the seed library's sharing plan is the real treasure.
