Give Night Creatures a Break

- ① On warm evenings, porch lights can draw many insects away from dark places where they feed, rest, or find mates. Moths and other nighttime insects may circle a bright bulb for a long time. This neighborhood notice asks families to try one small change: turn off outdoor lights when they are not needed at night.
- ② **TRY THIS TONIGHT:** Before bed, look outside. Is a light shining on an empty driveway or yard? Switch it off, or use a timer so it does not stay on all night. If your family needs a safety light, ask an adult about a shield that points light downward. Small choices can make darker spaces.
- ③ **FACT BOX:** Many moths help pollinate flowers after sunset. Their caterpillars are food for birds and other animals. During Dark Sky Week, the library will collect family ideas on a lobby board. Write one idea on a paper star and place it on the board by Friday. One dark porch can become part of a brighter plan for nature.

2	The notice uses "your family" and tells readers to ask an adult. What audience do these details suggest? Explain.	It is aimed at families, including children who can take part with an adult.
3	How does the FACT BOX support the purpose of the notice, compared with directions alone?	It gives facts about why moths matter, helping readers see a reason to take action.
4	The final sentence connects "one dark porch" to a "brighter plan." What effect does this wording have on the style or tone?	The contrast creates a hopeful, memorable style and makes one small action seem part of a larger effort.
