The Library Roof Garden

- ① On Saturday, volunteers opened a small garden on the roof of Maple Library. The garden has raised beds, a rain barrel, and herbs that visitors may smell but not pick. One event can become several kinds of writing. Each genre has a purpose, so a writer chooses details that help readers use or understand the text in a particular way.
- ② A news brief about the opening would give the date, place, and main facts. It might name the volunteers and explain the garden rules. A reporter would not need to describe every person's thoughts. News readers need clear, timely information, so the brief would focus on what happened and where, rather than on a long personal reaction.
- ③ A journal entry from a volunteer could tell a different version of the same day. The writer might describe carrying soil upstairs, feeling nervous before visitors arrived, and feeling proud when a child noticed the mint. These details would help readers understand one person's experience. A set of gardening directions, however, would include steps, materials, and safety tips instead of feelings.
