Choices That Fit Me

- ① At the library, I usually head for realistic fiction, especially stories about students starting something new. I like noticing how a character handles a problem with friends or family. Last month, I finished a novel about a girl joining a robotics club. The chapter titles gave small hints about what might happen, so I paused after each one to make predictions.
- ② When I write, I prefer a personal narrative in a notebook or on a computer. I enjoy choosing one small moment, such as missing the bus, instead of telling about a whole day. I use dialogue to show what people said, and I add sensory details like the cold rail under my hand. Planning with a quick timeline helps me keep events in order.
- ③ For school research, I choose short articles with headings, photographs, and captions. These features help me locate facts before I read every paragraph closely. I also like listening to an audiobook while following the printed pages because I can hear the expression in dialogue. Poems are not my first choice, but I sometimes enjoy poems that use strong images to describe nature.
