A Garden Above the Street

- ① On the roof of a library in Chicago, gardeners grow tomatoes, beans, and herbs in raised beds. The garden does more than provide food. Soil and plants absorb some rainwater, so less water rushes into street drains during storms. The plants also make the roof cooler in summer by shading the building and releasing water vapor.
- ② Rooftop gardens can help people, too. At the library, volunteers pick ripe vegetables and share them with a nearby food pantry. Bees visit the flowering herbs, which helps pollinate plants in the area. Because the roof is easy to see from upper windows, students can watch seeds sprout and insects visit without leaving the building.
- ③ These benefits come with challenges. A roof must be strong enough to hold wet soil, plants, and people. Gardeners also need a plan for watering during dry weeks. Still, the library garden shows how one unused space can serve several purposes: managing rain, growing food, supporting pollinators, and giving students a place to observe nature.
