A Refill Station Idea

- ① Our school could add a bottle-refill station near the gym. Students often finish practice thirsty, and the nearest fountain is across the hall. A refill station connects to a fountain and fills reusable bottles. It can also have a counter that shows how many plastic bottles the station may have helped replace. This feature makes a daily choice visible.
- ② I think the station could help our school use fewer single-use bottles. In a lunchtime tally last week, 18 of 30 students who walked past the gym carried reusable bottles. This suggests that many students could use a refill station. However, the tally was brief and taken in only one place, so it cannot tell us how many students would refill bottles each day.
- ③ Before deciding, the student council should compare the station's price with the cost of keeping it working. The council should also ask the custodian whether the gym fountain has the needed plumbing. A two-week count of students who bring reusable bottles could give stronger evidence. These details would help the principal decide whether the idea is practical for the school, not just popular.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
