Following the Monarchs

- ① Jordan needed information for a class poster about how monarch butterflies migrate. Before opening an article, Jordan chose a purpose: learn why monarchs travel long distances. Jordan also set two goals, find the route monarchs follow and discover what helps them survive the trip. These goals helped Jordan notice which facts belonged on the poster and which details could be skipped.
- ② Halfway through, Jordan read that monarchs use the sun and Earth's magnetic field to help them navigate. The phrase magnetic field was confusing. Instead of guessing, Jordan paused, reread the nearby sentences, and used a diagram's labels. Jordan learned that this field is an invisible force around Earth that can help guide animals. After checking understanding, Jordan could explain the idea in simple words.
- ③ At the end of the article, Jordan had found the migration route but only one detail about survival. Jordan adjusted the plan by reading a second, shorter source about nectar plants. That source explained that monarchs need nectar for energy during migration. Jordan then checked the poster notes against the original goals and added a heading for each goal on the poster.
