### What Corals Really Are

- ① Coral reefs look like colorful underwater gardens, so some visitors may think corals are plants or rocks. Prior knowledge can help readers notice what seems familiar, but it must be tested. Corals are animals. Each coral is made of tiny animals called polyps. Polyps have mouths and use tentacles to catch small food drifting in the water.
- ② Another detail adds to this idea. Many reef-building corals contain tiny algae that live inside their tissues. The algae use sunlight to make sugars, and the corals use some of those sugars. In return, the coral gives the algae a protected place and materials they need. This partnership helps explain why many reefs grow best in clear, sunlit, shallow water.
- ③ Prior knowledge might suggest that a pale coral is simply old or covered with sand. However, coral bleaching happens when stress, often unusually warm water, causes corals to lose their algae. A bleached coral is still alive at first, but it has less food from algae and is more likely to die if stressful conditions continue. Readers can revise an earlier idea after learning this evidence.
