A Place to Wait

- ① Dear School Board Members, Our school library stays open for twenty minutes after dismissal, but many students wait nearly an hour for late buses. I am writing as a fifth grader who rides Bus 12. On rainy days, I sit in the crowded hallway with other riders, unable to finish homework or choose a book. The library would give us a quiet, useful place to wait.
- ② Next Tuesday, the school board will discuss next year's budget. Keeping the library open until the last bus leaves would require an adult staff member, so the plan costs money. Still, it could help bus riders read, study, and stay safe indoors. Families and teachers may also appreciate knowing where children are during the wait.
- ③ I know the board must choose among many needs, including classroom supplies and building repairs. My view is that a longer library schedule is a wise use of school funds because it supports students who cannot leave right away. Please consider this idea at Tuesday's meeting. Thank you for listening to a student bus rider. Sincerely, Maya Chen.

1	Who wrote this letter, and who is the main audience? Use one clue from the letter to support your answer.	Maya Chen, a fifth-grade bus rider, wrote the letter for the school board. The greeting says, "Dear School Board Members," and Maya signs the letter.
2	What upcoming event gives the letter its context? How does that event shape Maya's request?	The school board will discuss next year's budget on Tuesday. Maya asks the board to use funds to keep the library open longer.
3	What is Maya's point of view about keeping the library open later? Give one reason she gives for this view.	Maya believes longer library hours are a wise use of school funds. She says bus riders could read, study, and wait safely indoors.
4	How does Maya show that she understands the school board's responsibilities? Why might this make her message stronger for that audience?	She says the board must choose among needs such as classroom supplies and building repairs. This shows she understands the board must make budget choices, so her request sounds thoughtful.
