The Library Seed Shelf

- ① At Maple Street Library, a new seed shelf will open on Saturday. Visitors may take small packets of bean, basil, and marigold seeds without paying. In return, the library asks gardeners to save a few seeds from healthy plants at the end of the season. The shelf helps neighbors try gardening and keeps local seed varieties circulating.
- ② Families, classroom groups, and experienced gardeners can all use the shelf. A child can watch a bean sprout, while a skilled gardener can share seeds that grow well in our area. By borrowing and returning seeds, community members can build a colorful garden network. The library hopes the shelf will make gardening feel possible, even for people with little money or space.
- ③ To use the shelf, choose one packet and write its name and the date in the checkout notebook. Plant the seeds by following the directions on the packet. If you cannot grow plants at home, look for the library's Saturday potting table, where volunteers will provide soil and containers. Bring questions, ideas, or extra seeds to the Garden Day meeting in June.
