Night Sky Walk

- ① Calling all fifth-grade explorers! On Thursday, October 8, our school will host a free Night Sky Walk at Pine Ridge Park. Bring a grown-up and meet at the picnic shelter at 7:15 p.m. The page's large moon photo and the heading "Look Up!" catch attention. A small map shows families where to park and walk.
- ② Families, please wear sturdy shoes and bring a flashlight with a red cover if you have one. Volunteers will guide children along the short trail, so younger brothers and sisters may come too. The event page uses a calendar symbol beside the date and a flashlight symbol beside the packing list. These pictures help busy adults find important details quickly.
- ③ If clouds cover the sky, the walk will move to the school gym, where a science teacher will use a projector to show star patterns. Check the school website by 5:00 p.m. for weather news. We hope you will join us, ask questions, and share the night with your family. This friendly invitation helps neighbors feel welcome and ready to participate.

1	Who is the main audience for this event page? Use two details from the page to support your answer.	The main audience is fifth-grade students and their families. The page says “fifth-grade explorers,” tells readers to bring a grown-up, and addresses “Families.”
2	What is the main purpose of the event page?	Its purpose is to invite fifth graders and their families to the Night Sky Walk and help them prepare to attend.
3	What information does each symbol help readers find: the calendar symbol and the flashlight symbol?	The calendar symbol helps readers find the date. The flashlight symbol helps readers find the packing list.
4	Which sentence or phrase makes the invitation sound friendly and welcoming? Explain how it affects the reader.	“We hope you will join us” makes the message sound personal and welcoming. It helps readers feel invited to participate.
