GARDEN WATERING GUIDE

- ① **WHY WATER EARLY?** Our school garden needs water before the day gets hot. When sunlight and wind warm the soil, water can evaporate quickly. Early watering gives plant roots more time to take in moisture. It also keeps leaves drier during the day, which can help prevent some plant diseases. Bring a filled bottle only if you cannot use the hose.
- ② **SET UP THE HOSE** First, check that the hose reaches the garden bed without crossing a walkway. Next, turn the faucet slowly and aim the spray at the soil near each plant. Then move from one row to the next, giving each area a gentle drink. Finally, turn off the faucet tightly and coil the hose so no one trips.
- ③ **CHOOSE A TIME** Morning and late afternoon both offer cooler air than midday. Morning may work best when volunteers arrive before classes, while late afternoon may fit an after-school garden club. Avoid watering at the hottest time, because more water may disappear from the soil. Check the class schedule, then choose the time that lets the garden get enough water.
