The Monarch Journey

- ① Each autumn, millions of monarch butterflies leave parts of the United States and Canada for mountain forests in central Mexico. Unlike most butterflies, this generation can live for many months. The travelers follow sunlight and air currents, crossing fields, towns, and rivers. Their orange wings flash like tiny signal flags as they search for nectar and sheltered places to rest.
- ② In Mexico, the monarchs cluster on oyamel fir trees, where cool temperatures help them save energy. A branch may hold so many butterflies that it seems to wear an orange blanket. When the sun warms the forest, groups lift into the air above them. The quiet trees suddenly become busy streets, filled with fluttering travelers.
- ③ In spring, monarchs leave Mexico and fly north. They lay eggs on milkweed plants along the way, and the caterpillars that hatch later form chrysalises and emerge as new butterflies. No single butterfly completes the whole return trip. Instead, several generations carry the journey north, like runners passing a baton from one team member to the next in a relay.
