Moonlit Hatchlings

- ① At dusk, the beach looked empty, but the sand held a secret. Beneath a small mound, dozens of loggerhead turtle eggs began to crack. One hatchling pushed through the loose grains and lifted its round head. The moon painted a silver path across the water, and the tiny turtle turned toward that shining road without stopping.
- ② More hatchlings wriggled free, flippers sweeping like little paddles. They did not know the beach was dangerous, yet their bodies followed the brightest horizon. A ghost crab skittered nearby, then vanished into a hole. The hatchlings hurried over ridges of sand, leaving thin tracks that curled behind them like lines drawn by a shaking pencil.
- ③ At the edge of the surf, a wave rushed forward and wrapped the first turtle in foam. For a moment, the hatchling disappeared. Then it bobbed up, paddling hard, while another wave carried it farther from shore. Soon, the dark water swallowed the small travelers, but their journey had only begun. Years later, some may return to this same beach.
