The Return Box

"Is someone in there?" she asked, holding her breath.
- ② She set the box beneath a lamp beside the school door. The yellow light showed a striped tail slipping through a crack near the lid. Maya remembered the missing cat poster in the library window. Her hands shook, but she slowly lifted the lid. A frightened kitten blinked up at her and gave one small meow.
- ③ Maya laughed with relief and wrapped her scarf around the kitten. Then she noticed a silver tag on its collar. It read, "Pip, 14 Cedar Lane." Maya called her father, and together they walked to the address. When a boy opened the door, Pip leaped into his arms. The boy's worried face softened. "Thank you for bringing him home," he said.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	How does the description of the wind and leaves help shape the mood at the beginning?	It makes the playground seem quiet and uneasy, which builds tension.
2	How do Maya's actions of stopping and holding her breath affect the pace of the story?	They slow the action and make the reader wait to learn what is inside the box.
3	What does Maya's question, "Is someone in there?" reveal about her?	It shows that she is worried and curious about the sound in the box.
4	How does the writer change the mood at the end? Use one detail from the passage in your answer.	The mood changes from tense to relieved and happy. For example, Pip leaps into the boy's arms, and the boy's worried face softens.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Rain tapped the bus shelter roof as Leo spotted a backpack under the bench. He reached for it, then pulled back when it buzzed. "Did you hear that?" he whispered. A phone inside lit up with a message from its worried owner, and Leo smiled as he carried the backpack to the driver.
