Accounts of a Moon Landing

- ① On July 20, 1969, Apollo 11 astronaut Neil Armstrong became the first person to step onto the Moon. Two accounts describe the moment. One is a recorded interview that Armstrong gave in 1986. The other is a 2019 article by science reporter Maya Chen. Chen studied mission records, photographs, and interviews while preparing her article about the landing.
- ② In his interview, Armstrong remembered moving carefully down the ladder after the landing. He said the Moon's surface was fine and powdery, and dust rose when he touched it with his boot. He also recalled that the view of Earth was striking. He described the scene as he began working outside the spacecraft during Apollo 11's moonwalk that day.
- ③ Chen's article explains that Apollo 11 launched from Florida on July 16 and carried Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin, and Michael Collins. It states that Armstrong and Aldrin landed on the Moon while Collins stayed in orbit. Chen also reports that about 400,000 people worked on the Apollo program, whose goal included bringing the crew safely back to Earth.
