City Trees Help

- ① City trees do more than make sidewalks look green. Their leafy tops form a canopy, which is a layer of branches and leaves above the street. On a hot day, the canopy blocks some sunlight from pavement and buildings. Shade can make nearby surfaces cooler, helping people and pets feel more comfortable as they walk or wait for a bus.
- ② Trees also affect rainwater. When rain falls on a bare parking lot, much of it rushes across the hard surface. A tree canopy catches some drops first, and its roots help soil soak up water. As a result, less water may flow quickly into storm drains. This can lower the chance of puddles and flooding during heavy rain.
- ③ Not every tree cools a place in the same way. A young tree has a small canopy, while a mature tree usually has more leaves and casts wider shade. Both kinds can help a neighborhood over time. Communities often plant young trees now because, as the trees grow, their benefits can reach more streets, homes, and playgrounds.
