YOUR JOB Part 1: Underline matching end rhymes, number the syllables in each haiku line, and draw a box around the five-line limerick. These marks will help you notice how each poem type is built.

Poems at the Window

- ① Rhymed verse uses a pattern of matching sounds at ends of lines. Read this four-line poem about a kite: My red kite climbs into the sky. It dips above a maple tree. A gust pulls hard, then lets it fly. Its bright tail waves at me. Its rhyme pattern helps the poem sound steady and musical.
- ② A haiku often captures one small moment in nature. Its three lines are very short: Cool rain taps window. Puddles mirror silver clouds. Sparrows shake wet wings. Each line adds a clear picture. The middle line is longer, giving the poem a quick, balanced shape. Readers can hear a brief pause after each line and notice the sounds in every word.
- ③ Free verse needs no regular rhyme or set number of lines. It uses line breaks to shape an idea: Night train rattles past, windows flashing like quick stars. A limerick has five lines and usually follows a bouncy rhyme pattern: A fox found a hat in the glen. He wore it, then wore it again. It slipped in the rain. He chased down the lane. Then laughed with his friends in the glen.

Morning Fog Morning fog slides over fields, hiding fence posts one by one. Drumming Frog A frog found a drum by a pond. He played for the fish from beyond. His rhythm rang bright. Till a deer came in sight. Then bowed to the reeds by the pond.

Accept the stated rhyme schemes, 5-7-5 syllable count, and supported comparisons of poem structures. For Part 3, accept varied original topics if the free verse has four lines and the limerick has five lines with an AABBA end-rhyme pattern.
