Following Monarchs

- ① Each fall, millions of monarch butterflies begin a long migration from Canada and the United States to mountain forests in central Mexico. Migration is a seasonal journey that animals make between places. Monarchs cannot survive a cold northern winter, so they follow a route south. The route may stretch thousands of miles. A single butterfly does not complete the round trip. Instead, several generations travel north in spring, while a later generation returns south in autumn each year.
- ② Scientists study this movement by attaching a tiny tag to a butterfly's wing. The tag has a code, or a set of letters and numbers, that identifies the insect. When someone finds a tagged monarch, the finder can report the code and location. Researchers analyze, or examine closely, these reports. Their evidence helps them estimate where butterflies travel and how long the trip takes. This information can reveal which habitats, places where organisms live, monarchs need along their route.
- ③ Tracking data can support conservation, the protection of living things and their environments. For example, volunteers may plant milkweed, the only plant monarch caterpillars eat, in school gardens. Scientists also monitor forest areas in Mexico where monarchs rest during winter. To evaluate, or judge carefully, whether these actions help, researchers compare butterfly counts from different years. A larger count does not prove that one action caused the change, but it gives scientists information to investigate. Careful vocabulary helps readers understand both the data and the conservation plan.
