A Cooler Campus Plan

- ① On a hot afternoon, Maya's science club surveyed the blocks around their school. They recorded the location, trunk width, and condition of each street tree. The group found that the parking-lot side had little shade because only three young trees grew there. In contrast, the playground had a wider tree canopy, the layer of leaves and branches that spreads above the ground. Their data gave them evidence to discuss where new trees could make the campus cooler.
- ② Next, the club analyzed its measurements and created a map. They used symbols to show mature trees, saplings, and empty planting spaces. A mature tree has a larger trunk and a more developed canopy than a sapling. The map helped the students compare areas instead of relying on guesses. They estimated that planting six trees along the parking lot could increase shade near the building. This estimate was a prediction based on their measurements, not a promise about the exact future result.
- ③ At the next school board meeting, Maya presented the club's findings. She said, "Our survey indicates that the parking-lot edge has limited canopy cover. We recommend planting native trees there because their roots can help absorb rainwater." Native trees are species that grow naturally in a region. Maya chose precise words for her audience. Saying "trees can help" was less clear than explaining how roots absorb water. The board asked the principal to examine the proposal and calculate the cost.
