Peregrines Above the Streets

- ① On tall city buildings, peregrine falcons often perch on ledges that resemble the cliffs where their ancestors nested. From a high lookout, a bird can scan the streets for pigeons or other prey. Its sharp eyes notice movement far below. When a falcon spots a meal, it may launch into a steep dive. The busy city seems noisy to people, but the high ledge gives the falcon a protected place to rest, watch, and raise young.
- ② Falcons are adaptable hunters, so they can use structures people built instead of natural rock faces. A window washing platform may serve as a temporary perch, and a quiet corner can shelter chicks. Adult falcons share duties at the nest. One parent may guard the eggs while the other searches for food. This teamwork is especially useful in a crowded place, where people, traffic, and other birds move through the same small spaces during daylight hours.
- ③ Researchers watch these birds without climbing to every nest. Some groups place a small band on a chick's leg, giving each bird an identifying number. Later, a person who sees the band can report where the falcon traveled. Reports from many observers create a living map of the birds' movements. The map helps scientists learn which nesting sites stay successful and which areas may need protection. By studying the reports, communities can make safer choices about nearby construction.
