Falcons in the City

- ① On tall city buildings, peregrine falcons use ledges much like the cliffs where they once nested. A nesting pair may choose a sheltered corner, called an eyrie, that keeps eggs away from wind and heavy rain. In spring, volunteers sometimes watch the site from the street. They record when the adults bring food and when the young birds first appear. These observations help scientists learn whether the falcons are raising chicks safely in a busy place above the traffic.
- ② City falcons face hazards that their cliff-dwelling relatives rarely meet. A window can reflect the sky, making glass seem like open air to a fast-flying bird. Some buildings dim lights during migration, the seasonal movement of animals from one region to another. This change can reduce collisions at night. Wildlife workers also place a small band, or numbered ring, around a chick's leg. If the bird is seen later, the band helps researchers trace its travels.
- ③ These records can reveal a surprising pattern. A chick that leaves its eyrie may return to the same city years later to breed. Yet a single sighting is not enough to prove a trend, a repeated change over time. Researchers compare many reports before they draw a conclusion. When residents report a falcon, they should note the date, location, and any leg band they can read from a safe distance. Careful reports turn quick glimpses into useful evidence.

1	What does eyrie most likely mean? Which details in paragraph 1 support your answer?	An eyrie is a sheltered nest site for falcons. The passage calls it a sheltered corner and says it keeps eggs away from wind and heavy rain.
2	What does migration mean in paragraph 2? Use nearby words to explain.	Migration is the seasonal movement of animals from one region to another.
3	What does trend most likely mean in paragraph 3? What words give you the clue?	A trend is a repeated change or pattern over time. The clue is "a repeated change over time."
4	What does trace most likely mean in the last sentence of paragraph 2? Explain how the band helps researchers do it.	Trace means follow or track the bird's travels. A numbered leg band can identify the bird when it is seen later.
