Garden Help Needed

- ① Sixth graders, our school garden needs your help this Friday. Wind scattered mulch across the paths, and the tomato beds need new stakes before the plants grow taller. Meet by the garden gate at 3:15 with closed-toe shoes and a water bottle. You do not need gardening experience. You only need willing hands. In one hour, we can clear paths, tie plants, and make the space ready for visiting families. This work also keeps small visitors from tripping.
- ② Why should you come? The garden is more than a row of plants. Science classes measure insects there, the cafeteria uses some herbs, and younger students read on the shaded bench. When the paths are blocked, those activities become harder. Your work will help many people use the garden safely. Can you picture a second grader spotting a butterfly because you cleared the way? That small task matters. It can begin with you on Friday.
- ③ Sign up on the sheet outside Room 214 by Thursday afternoon. If you can stay for only thirty minutes, write that beside your name, since every bit of help is useful. First, volunteers will receive gloves and a quick safety check. Then we will work in small teams near an adult. Come make the garden welcoming. Bring your energy, bring a friend, and bring the care our shared space deserves. It is waiting for us.
