A Seed-Sharing Shelf

- ① At the town library, Maya presented a plan for a seed-sharing shelf. She began, "Have you ever wanted to grow a plant but did not know where to find seeds?" Several people raised their hands. Maya explained that gardeners could leave labeled seed packets and take packets they could use. Then she paused and asked, "What information would you need on each label?" A visitor answered, "The plant name and planting time." Maya repeated the idea so everyone could hear it.
- ② One child asked, "Could the shelf include seeds from native plants?" Maya answered, "Yes, if the packet says which plant it is and where the seeds came from." She added that native plants grow naturally in a region and can provide food or shelter for local animals. Another visitor wondered whether the library would give advice about gardening. Maya said, "The shelf will have basic planting guides, and library staff can help people find books." By answering both questions clearly, Maya helped the audience understand how the shelf would work.
- ③ Before ending, Maya invited more questions. A man asked, "What happens if someone takes seeds but cannot leave any?" Maya replied, "They may still take a packet. The shelf depends on sharing, but it is open to anyone." She then asked the audience, "What could make this shelf easier for new gardeners to use?" People suggested picture labels and a small basket for donated tools. Maya thanked them and wrote down the suggestions. Their ideas could improve the plan before the shelf opened.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
