A Refill Station Proposal

- ① Before writing a proposal for a refill station near the gym, I made a three-part plan. First, I would explain the problem: students finish practice thirsty, and the nearest fountain is across the building. Next, I would present evidence about a solution. A refill station could provide chilled water and let students fill reusable bottles. Last, I would explain the benefits to our school. This order moves from a clear need to a practical answer and then to reasons the answer matters.
- ② To choose evidence for the middle section, I would keep information that helps the reader judge whether the station would work. For example, the station can reduce the need for single-use plastic bottles, which often become trash after games. I would leave out the color of the gym walls because it does not support the solution. I would also place a cost estimate in this section, since decision makers need to know whether the idea is possible.
- ③ In the final section, I would focus on the strongest results. Reusable bottles could save students money over time, and easier access to water may help athletes drink enough during practice. I would end by asking the principal to consider the station before the next sports season. The details about trash, cost, savings, and hydration connect to my three-part plan. Together, they give the proposal useful information and make the request more convincing for school leaders.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Idea: Install a covered bike rack. 1. Need: The current rack fills before school starts; bikes can sit in rain all day. 2. Solution: A covered rack gives bikes a roof; it can be built beside the existing rack. 3. Benefits: *Dry storage can protect bikes from weather; *more spaces can let more students ride to school. I would ask the principal to consider the rack for next year.
