Maya Revises a Wetland Article

- ① When Maya drafted a short article about a nearby wetland, she began with, “Wetlands are places with water.” Her teacher wrote, “Start with a detail that helps readers picture the place.” Maya also noticed that her first paragraph listed animals before explaining what a wetland is. She highlighted the opening and wrote a new plan: describe the habitat, explain its value, then name animals that depend on it. This plan would guide the order of her revision.
- ② In the next draft, Maya opened with, “At sunrise, tall grasses along the pond hold silver drops of water.” Then she added, “A wetland is land that stays wet for part or all of the year.” This sentence gave readers needed information before the animal examples. She replaced the broad word nice in “Wetlands are nice for birds” with “Wetlands provide nesting, food, and shelter for many birds.” She checked a field guide and named great blue herons and red-winged blackbirds, two birds often found in North American wetlands.
- ③ Maya ended her article by returning to the sunrise scene: “When wetlands are protected, the pond can keep supporting life from dawn to dusk.” She removed a repeated sentence about water and placed her strongest facts near the beginning. During self-evaluation, she asked whether each paragraph had one clear job. A classmate suggested adding a transition between the definition and the bird examples. Maya inserted “Because wetlands offer these conditions, many animals can live there.” Her final article moved smoothly and gave readers a clearer picture.
