The March on Washington

- ① On August 28, 1963, more than 200,000 people gathered near the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., for the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Many Black Americans still faced legal segregation in parts of the United States, especially in Southern states. Organizers chose the memorial because it honored President Abraham Lincoln, whose Emancipation Proclamation had declared freedom for enslaved people during the Civil War. The setting connected the march to a longer struggle for civil rights.
- ② Speakers and performers brought cultural traditions to the program. Gospel singer Mahalia Jackson sang before Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. spoke. Her music drew on the Black church, a community center and source of strength for many civil rights activists. King then delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. His words described a future in which people would be judged by character rather than race. The audience's songs, signs, and speeches showed that the event was both a protest and a shared public gathering.
- ③ Television networks broadcast parts of the march, allowing people far from Washington to watch it. Newspapers printed photographs of the crowd and reported on King's speech. The march happened while Congress was debating a civil rights bill. In 1964, Congress passed the Civil Rights Act, which banned segregation in many public places and job discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Knowing what was happening in the country helps a reader understand why the march drew such attention.
