Maple Park Pollinator Garden

- ① At the east entrance of Maple Park, a new pollinator garden will open on May 18. The garden contains native flowers, such as purple coneflower and black-eyed Susan, that provide nectar and pollen for bees and butterflies. Signs along the path explain how pollinators help many plants make seeds. Families and classes can use the garden to observe insects without touching them. A low fence protects young plants while still allowing visitors to see the beds.
- ② The garden also needs people who can help it grow. On Saturday mornings in June, volunteers will pull weeds, spread mulch, and refill the water barrel. Students younger than fourteen should work with an adult. Bring a hat, a water bottle, and closed-toe shoes. To join a workday, scan the code on the park website or sign up at the library desk. Even one hour of work can keep the paths clear and give seedlings room to grow.
- ③ Local businesses and residents can support the project in another way. A donation of \$15 pays for a plant label that names one species and describes its role in the garden. The Friends of Maple Park will list donors in its July newsletter, unless a donor asks to remain private. Visitors who cannot donate can still help by staying on paths and sharing what they learn. With care from many people, the garden can become a useful outdoor classroom and a safe stop for pollinators.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What is one purpose of the first paragraph, and which audience does it target? Use two details from the paragraph.	Its purpose is to inform families, classes, and park visitors about the garden and how to use it safely. Details include the signs for learning, observing insects without touching them, and the low fence.
2	How do the directions in paragraph 2 target volunteers instead of general park visitors? Use two details.	They give volunteers specific work information, including Saturday morning tasks in June and how to sign up. They also tell volunteers what to bring and state that younger students need an adult.
3	Paragraph 3 has two purposes. Identify each purpose and its intended audience.	One purpose is to ask local businesses and residents for donations. The other is to guide visitors, including people who cannot donate, to help by staying on paths and sharing what they learn.
4	How does the text develop its multiple purposes from beginning to end? Explain the order of the paragraphs.	It first introduces the garden and its learning value for visitors, then recruits volunteers to care for it, and finally asks for donations while giving all visitors ways to help. This order helps readers understand the project before choosing how to support it.
