Tide Pool Field Card

- ① ****TIDE POOL FIELD CARD | For Shoreline Visitors**** At low tide, rocky pools hold seawater after the ocean moves back. These pools can warm quickly in sunlight, and their salt level can change when rain falls. Sea stars, anemones, small fish, and crabs use the pools as temporary homes. The animals may be exposed to wind and sun until the tide returns. Quiet observation helps you notice how each creature is suited to this changing edge between land and sea.
- ② ****LOOK CLOSELY, LEAVE WILDLIFE IN PLACE**** 1. Step only on bare rock. 2. Keep hands out of pools. 3. Watch for waves. A tide pool holds living things that can be harmed by a shoe, a hand, or a sudden splash. Wet rocks can also be slippery. Stand still for a moment, then look for movement under ledges and between seaweed. You may see a crab lift one claw or an anemone close its tentacles near the water.
- ③ ****PHOTO CAPTION: Purple sea stars cling to a wet rock as the tide rises.**** The image shows one animal that visitors may find in the splash zone. Sea stars move slowly with hundreds of tiny tube feet, which also help them hold onto surfaces. ****SOURCE NOTE:**** Facts adapted from National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration tide-pool materials. Use the source name to find maps, photographs, and more information about shore habitats. Check local signs as well, because rules can differ from one beach to another.

1	What audience does the line below the title name? How does that audience help explain the card's brief, action-focused format?	The audience is shoreline visitors. They need quick facts and directions while exploring the shore.
2	Which text feature helps a reader find the safety steps most quickly? Explain how it helps.	The numbered list under the bold warning helps most. It separates the actions and puts them in an easy-to-scan order.
3	How does the photo caption aid a reader's understanding of the information?	It identifies a purple sea star and shows the wet-rock setting where a visitor may see one.
4	What can a reader do because the card includes a source note?	The reader can find NOAA materials, such as maps and photographs, to learn more about shore habitats.
